



Captain's Log – Stardate 220209.0930

The Starship Kelawar arrived in the outer rim system known as Mantin. Initial scanning of the atmosphere suggested the air was heavy in moisture and warm. While a little unpleasant for physical exertion, it should be breathable for humanoid biology.
